These students then became eligible to take the NCLEX, so they could be fully certified registered nurses to care for others and benefit their community. The class had a 100% job placement post-graduation.

New Veterinary Assistant Course

In July 2022, PCC introduced the new Veterinary Assistant short-term workforce training course. This is an entry level course where students learn the impact of the human-animal bond, veterinary safety and sanitation, patient vital signs, animal restraint methods, and the role of a Veterinary Assistant during a veterinary emergency.

This program prepares students to become a Certified Veterinary Assistant (CVA) Level 1 through the Texas Veterinary Medical Association (TVMA), after successful completion of training and documentation of laboratory, classroom, and clinical hours under the supervision of a licensed veterinarian or certified veterinary technician.



Fossil Exploration

Roxboro native Kaleigh Long visited PCC to showcase actual fossils and explain what it's like to be part of a paleontological dig. Fossils she shared included an ammonite shell, a raptor claw, a hadrosaur vertebrae, a T-Rex tooth, and more.



PTK Induction

PCC inducted 21 new members into the College's Alpha Upsilon Theta chapter of Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) International Honor Society for the fall 2022 semester and 26 new members for the spring 2023 semester.

Stakeholders from across the region attended the event, including many of the project’s financial donors which include the Danville Regional Foundation and the North Carolina Tobacco Trust Fund Commission.

Many local farmers are currently supplying 4P Foods with local, Caswell-grown products that are sent all over the region, and many more farmers are working with officials to begin producing for them as well. CEAD is already having significant economic impacts for the community.

The second and third phases of the project include the construction of an education building which will house PCC’s Agribusiness Technology program and the afterschool agriculture program for local youth, Breakthrough Learning in Agriculture Science Technology (BLAST!).
