ASSOCIATE DEGREE NURSING PROGRAM ADMISSIONS POLICY

GENERAL INFORMATION

Piedmont Community College's Associate Degree Nursing (ADN) Program is a full-time, five-semester (for the Traditional cohorts) or six-semester (for the Evening/Weekend cohorts) curriculum that prepares the student for a career in Nursing. The ADN curriculum provides knowledge, skills, and strategies to integrate safety and quality into nursing care, to practice in a dynamic environment, and to meet individual needs which impact health, quality of life, and achievement of potential.

ARE YOU READY?

Being a nurse involves decisions that will impact the lives of others. Nursing education programs are rigorous, content intensive, and comprehensive. Potential students should be aware of the demands and individual characteristics needed to be most successful in a nursing education program. The following list describes other important individual characteristics, in addition to self-efficacy, required of students to thrive in a nursing education program:

- Keen **observation, critical thinking,** and **clinical judgement** skills to guide legal, ethical, safe, and professional decisions.
- Verbal and non-verbal **communication** skills to effectively interact in all situations with other faculty, students, patients, families, and other health care workers.
- **Flexible schedule** to meet the class and clinical requirements, including several non-credit hours to prepare for class, clinical, examinations, simulation experiences, and other assignments.
- Reading comprehension to synthesize large quantities of information. Nursing education programs **require a large amount of reading**, and furthermore, understanding of what is being read.
- The **ability to conform to** group, social, and professional **"norms"** or expectations regarding appearance and behavior.

APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Applicants are provisionally admitted under the admission policies of PCC and the ADN Program. A new ADN cohort starts each Fall (Traditional cohort) and each Spring (Evening/Weekend cohort), and applicants are selected based on their achievement potential through review of previous academic records, scores on required Admissions Test, and number of available seats in the program. **The deadline for all required documents and testing is March 1 of the year prior to the Fall semester for the Traditional cohort and September 1 prior to the Spring semester for the Evening/Weekend cohort. This includes all transcripts from other institutions and any attempts to receive credit by exam for any required course.**

For a student to be considered for admission to the ADN program, the applicant must complete Phases I and II below. **Students may not take the PCC Admissions Test until Phase I is complete.** Failure to complete any portion of the requirements may jeopardize admission to the program.

PHASE I: Application and Admission Eligibility

- Submit a completed application to PCC by visiting www.piedmontcc.edu/admissions
- Official transcripts from high school and all other colleges sent to PCC **by the application deadline of March 1st (Traditional cohort) or September 1st (Evening/Weekend cohort)**. Have graduated or will graduate from high school or the equivalent, as recognized by the State of North Carolina, before entering the ADN program.
- Students will be required to show proficiency in math, reading and writing by placing into ENG 111 and MAT 143 or 152 without the co-requisite.
- Applicants are encouraged to complete required general education courses while awaiting admission to the nursing program.
- Any applicant who earns a “D” or “F” in a **required course** for the ADN program must repeat it **prior** to entering the nursing program and earn a grade of “C” or better.

PHASE II: Admissions Test, CNA Certification, and Program Application

- Upon completion of **ALL** Phase I requirements, eligible applicants can register to take the Admissions Test by completing the application, which is available online, and in the lobby of the L-building on the Person County campus. Testing dates are posted online on the PCC website, and in the lobby of the L-building on the Person County campus door. *Applicants who qualify for testing accommodations based on a disability, must request accommodations from PCC Accessibility Services, and notify the Director of Nursing Programs prior to taking the test.*
- Complete the Admissions Test. Students who achieve an overall score of 65% or higher on the Admissions Test may be given priority admission consideration because these scores favorably correlate with students’ success in completing the PCC Nursing program. Applicants are only allowed to test three times within a 6-month period. There are several Admission Test resources available on the PCC Nursing Programs website.
- By the August or January start dates, applicants must have successfully completed a North Carolina approved Certified Nurse Aide I program and be currently listed on the Nurse Aide I Registry with no substantiated findings of resident abuse, resident neglect, or misappropriation of resident property in a nursing facility. The Certified Nurse Aide I training program must include theory, lab, and clinical components. The applicant must provide a copy of the certificate of completion from an approved program. Challenging the Nurse Aide I examination will not meet this requirement. CMA, EMT, or LPN certifications can also be used to meet this requirement.

PHASE III: Selection Process and Notification of Admission Status

- Applicants who have met all entrance requirements and taken the Admissions Test will be considered by the Nursing Admission Committee. Consideration will be based upon the point system in the table on the following page. Courses considered for points must be completed by the end of the previous Fall semester.
- Notification will be sent by **April 15** (for Fall admissions) and by **October 15** (for Spring admissions) to those who completed the admission process. Applicants will receive one of the following letters from the Admissions Committee:
 - Conditional Acceptance Notice (See Phase IV)
 - Waiting List Notice
 - Not accepted – Low Admissions Test scores or Low GPA Notice
- Applicants not accepted must reapply the following year if admission is still desired.

PHASE IV: Acceptance

- Students accepted to the ADN program must:
 - Return intent form to the Director, PCC Nursing Programs by the required due date.
 - BIO 168 and NA I must be completed **prior** to entering the ADN program.
 - Show evidence of current American Heart Association (AHA) Healthcare Provider CPR certification
 - Attend a Mandatory Orientation on the designated date.
 - Show satisfactory completion of physical and emotional health by the student's primary care provider.
 - Show evidence of required immunizations and/or titers:
 - Annual COVID-19 & Influenza vaccines
 - MMR & Varicella (2 doses or titer)
 - Tetanus/Diphtheria (Tdap) (Within last 10 years)
 - Hep B Series & titer (3 doses or titer - May sign waiver)
 - Tuberculosis PPD skin test (Annual – 2-step required if no documentation within last year)
 - Complete required criminal background check (CBC) and initial drug screening through the designated service provider at the student's expense.

Transfer Students

Students who have successfully completed nursing (NUR) courses at another approved nursing education program may apply for consideration of advanced placement into the ADN program. Advanced placement is not routinely available and is contingent upon program capacity, curriculum alignment, clinical placement availability, and approval by the Nursing Admissions Committee. Students seeking advanced placement must score at least 80% on the corresponding challenge examination(s) for each nursing course for which credit is requested. Meeting challenge examination requirements does not guarantee admission or advanced placement.

Nursing Programs Readmission Policy

Effective July 1, 2026, any student who is academically ineligible to continue in the PCC ADN or PN programs may apply for readmission by the respective March 1 or September 1 deadline. Students who are ineligible to continue in the nursing program may meet with the Dean/Director or designee to discuss factors that may have contributed to unsuccessful progression and to develop an action plan to support future academic success should the student seek to apply for readmission.

Students who successfully completed prior NUR courses may be considered for reentry into the course in which they were academically unsuccessful, contingent upon curriculum sequencing, clinical placement availability, and Nursing Admissions Committee approval. To promote student success and strengthen foundational knowledge, faculty may recommend that a student repeat previously completed nursing coursework prior to reentry into the program. The final decision regarding acceptance of this recommendation remains with the student.

Applicants seeking readmission must meet the admission and progression standards in effect for the cohort to which they are seeking readmission and must satisfy all current nursing programs requirements.

Readmission decisions are made on a case-by-case basis through review by the Nursing Admissions Committee and are dependent upon available space and program resources. In evaluating readmission requests, the committee may consider factors including, but not limited to:

- Circumstances contributing to the student's unsuccessful attempt
- Overall academic performance
- Clinical performance and professional conduct
- Evidence of academic remediation and preparedness upon return

The Nursing Admissions Committee carefully reviews each application individually and reserves the discretion to determine whether readmission is appropriate based on the student’s readiness for successful progression, available program resources, and the standards necessary to support student success and safe nursing practice.

All readmission policies and procedures will be published and maintained in accordance with applicable North Carolina Board of Nursing regulations and institutional requirements to ensure accurate, consistent, and publicly accessible communication to applicants and students.
